Teaching – focuses on explaining God's word in an understandable way.

Leading - focuses on leading a group in a spiritual direction (e.g. children, youth, those with addictions, a church)

Exhorting - focuses on spiritually encouraging others (e.g. counseling, general encouragement, evangelism)

Giving – focuses on using material things for spiritual purposes (e.g. giving to missions, ministries, the needy).

Mercy – focuses on ministering to the hurting (e.g. the sick, the imprisoned, the needy).
